BRIXHAM ROYAL TORBAY HERITAGE SAILING REGATTA 28th- 29th May 2022

What a wonderful mix of boats arrived in Brixham in the celebratory year of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The inaugural Regatta took place over 100 years ago under the auspices of Her Majesty's grandfather King George V, whose Perpetual Challenge Cup is awarded annually to the fastest Brixham trawler.

A total of 30 boats entered in the Regatta this year, numbers gratifyingly returning towards pre-Covid levels. The popularity and success are a tribute to the hard work of the Heritage Regatta Committee, its team of stalwart helpers, Brixham Yacht Club and Torbay Harbour Authority; the latter kindly extending berthing facilities to our visiting Heritage vessels over the entire weekend.

Boats and crews were welcomed by our newly appointed Regatta Bosun, Graeme Hagar, to assist mooring in the sunshine; Graeme had also been stalwart in assisting the Regatta Secretary move a selection of semi-derelict boats off the Town Heritage Pontoon to enable all the Regatta boats to moor up together in true party spirit.

Boats came from all over the South West and the Isle of Wight. An informal start to the proceedings for boats from the west was the self-timed passage race from Dartmouth; many boats arrived by Friday evening and started a weekend of serious socialising at the Yacht Club. Saturday gave us perfect pontoon socialising weather; ice creams and cold pints were much in evidence. Registration and distribution of goodies bags on board the Brixham Trawler Pilgrim was accompanied by our excellent local sea shanty side "Missin' Tackle", who kindly gave their services in exchange for a pint; this was followed by the traditional fish pie supper at Brixham Yacht Club. We are very grateful for the generous donation of 30 Kgs of hake by the Brixham Trawler Agents – a great contribution towards our costs.

We all packed on board the Brixham Trawler Vigilance for the skippers' briefing on Sunday morning. Sunday was a little more overcast, thus affording more wind; a steady Force 3 from the east gave a spectacular Parade of Sail with all sails up. Torbay appeared to be in a time warp showing off a wide variety of heritage boat styles and rigs to their best. Whilst we were limited to the north and east areas of Torbay because of the Aero championship from Paignton, the Bay is plenty big enough for all and none of the boats felt restricted, and, indeed, enjoyed the colour and manoeuvrability of those darting dinghies in the distance.

We started with a reach down through the start off Battery Point, which is always a comfort for gaff rigged boats (and also, incidentally, junk rig, which has preferred sailing points similar to the gaffers). Then the windward mark up towards the Ore Stone, fetching towards Berry Head and then running back towards the start/finish line. At least that was the plan; the wind strength died away and together with the idiosyncrasies of the tidal system in Torbay reduced an anticipated 2 laps to 1 for most of us. An additional class had been introduced this year for large yachts, which included Cynthia, Little Tern, Escape and Springtide; Cynthia showed them all a clean pair of heels (or stern?) and I believe did 3 laps just for fun!

A special award was made to Katie McCabe who, at the age of 14, last year completed her solo passage round Britain in her pretty turquoise sloop 'Falanda'; we are full of admiration Katie, who also won the Classic Boat Young Sailor of the Year.

2022 was the best entry from SW Gaffers who really boosted the atmosphere with their expertise and engagement. Thanks to all 10 Gaff Rig Association members who took part; although Brixham Heritage Regatta is not an OGA event we enjoy their great support and thanks for bringing their lovely boats. Similarly the Junk Rig Association is now so much part of the fleet that they have their own class (6 boats) and trophy. Thanks go too to all the volunteers and the hard work by the berthing party was an enormous help; the 'behind the scenes' staff at the Yacht Club, the Regatta 'front of house' team in their platinum polo shirts, contrasting with the Royal Purple shirts ordered by many crew members, together with sweatshirts and caps. I did overhear very pleasing remarks "Everyone went out of their way to ensure that we had the best time we could – and did!", "the most inclusive of all regattas I've been to", "brilliant goodies bags with beer!"
